# The "why" of this presentation

- Interdisciplinary can also mean "confusing"
- Grad school = \$\$\$\$
- Limits unnecessary courses/time in college
- Expands options for veterinary/animal science students
- Clarifies options for students who are not interested in vet school but want to work with animals

- Maximizes advising efforts
- Reduces barriers that complicate progress and takes up advising time
- Connects HAI faculty with student mentees more easily
- Links to employers who value HAI-applied work/research



# **Historical beginnings of HAI**

1859 – Florence Nightingale, nurse

"A small pet animal is often an excellent companion for the sick" "If an individual can feed and clean the animal, they ought always be encouraged to do so"

1960s - Human animal bond – term first coined by Austrian zoologist Konrad Lorenz

Late 1960s – Boris Levinson published "Pet Oriented Child Psychotherapy" coined it "pet therapy"

1970s – Delta Foundation (Delta Society) formed, now Pet Partners; started American Veterinary Medical Association (AVMA) Human-Animal Bond Task Force



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1990s – International Society for Anthrozoology



1990s through current – various centers developing in universities, etc., field growing rapidly







# **Defining HAI**

American Veterinary Medical Association

"The human-animal bond is a **mutually beneficial and dynamic relationship between people and animals** that is influenced by behaviors that are essential to the health and well-being of both. This includes, but is not limited to, emotional, psychological and physical interactions of people, animals and the environment?"

Animals and Society definition of human animal studies:

"rapidly growing interdisciplinary field that examines the **complex and multidimensional relationships between humans and other animals**. Human animal studies comprises work in numerous disciplines -- social sciences (sociology, anthropology, psychology, political science) humanities (history, literary criticism, philosophy, geography), and natural sciences (ethology, veterinary medicine, animal welfare science and comparative psychology"



## Historical views about careers with a HAI focus

One example

- They may not be aware of MANY other career options in the field of HAI


